Join History instructor Dr. Michael Mangin for "Live and Learn"—three weeks of historical study and fieldwork in London, one of the liveliest cities in the world. This 3-unit course combines 12 hours per week of classroom instruction and about a dozen visits to historical and cultural sites. The cost of the program includes accommodations, transportation around the city, and access to a computer lab and classroom at our Kensington campus. Also included are walking tours and visits to the National Gallery, the British Museum, the Houses of Parliament, the Imperial War Museum, the Cabinet War Rooms, the Victoria and Albert Museum, the Globe Theater, the Museum of London, Westminster Abbey, and numerous other locations. You will also have the opportunity to attend several West End theater performances. Optional excursions to other points of interest in Britain and on the continent will also be available.

All participants have to attend ONE of the following orientation meetings scheduled in Room 425: Wednesday, February 17, from 3-5PM; Tuesday, February 23 from 3-5PM; or Saturday, March 6 from 1-3PM. Everyone must also attend an all-day pre-departure class in June (time and location TBA). The program cost does not include tuition and fees for three transferable units from Cabrillo College (approximately \$107).

Transfer Credit: CSU; UC with conditions: Students must retain a copy of the course outline, the course syllabus and work completed for this course. Credit for this course is contingent upon a review of the course outline and other materials by the UC transfer campus.

**This class will examine the historical, social, and economic experience of Mexican Americans in the United States. Course readings include primary texts by Rodolfo Acuña and Zaragoza Vargas as well as recent academic works on globalization, demographic shifts, the environment, and border violence. Students will take leadership of discussion, course projects, and written assignments.**
