# Cabrillo routs West Valley

Seahawks score season-high 33 points

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SARATOGA — Dylan Jackson scored twice, and Cabrillo College's banged up football team dominated at the line of scrimmage, helping the Seahawks roll to a 33-3 rout of West Valley in the teams' Coast Conference game at Saratoga High on Saturday.

Jackson finished with 141 yards rushing on 25 carries. He entered the game with 166 yards rushing in his previous six games, which came behind an injury depleted line that has endured several personnel changes this year.

"We're a little thin with injuries, but we still have a job to do and people to block," Jackson said. "I think all our injuries have brought the team together. ... We just want to finish the year strong. We are playing for something — Cabrillo."

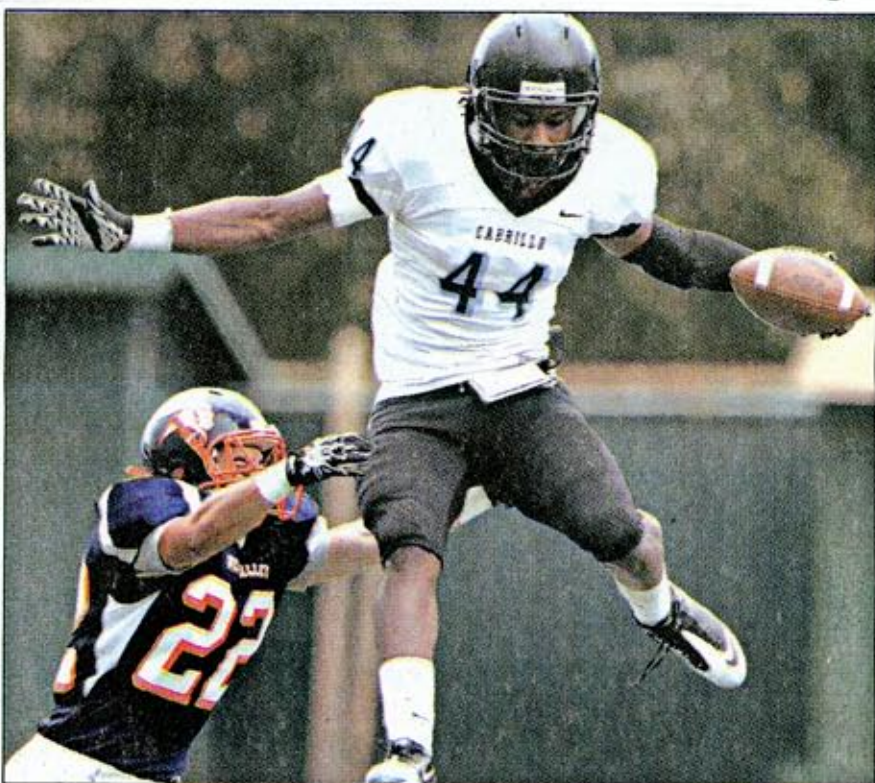
Cabrillo [3-6 overall, 2-2 Coast Conference] closes its season Saturday with a 7 p.m. home game against winless Gavilan [0-8, 0-3].

West Valley [1-8, 1-3], which was shut out by Hartnell 38-0 last week, closes its season Saturday at San Jose City [2-6, 2-1].

Cabrillo produced its highest point total of the season against West Valley. It scored 23 points in previous wins against Hartnell and Solano. The Seahawks hit the mark by starting No. 3 quarterback Brent Moyer. No. 2 Roberto Concha-Foley, who recovered from an injury last week, also saw action and completed a 32-yard touchdown pass to receiver Fernando Olivarez.

West Valley's cornerback fell down on the play, leaving Olivarez all alone for his third touchdown reception of the season and the 12th of his two-year Cabrillo career.

"Whenever we had positive stuff happen, we shoot ourselves in the foot on

either side of the ball," Vikings coach Jim Winkler said. "It's third-and-27 and our guy's in bump coverage. We knew he was going to throw to No. 4 [Olivarez]. They always do when he's in there. It's not like we don't know who he is. We just have to grow up and get better."

Cabrillo also scored on a 2-yard touchdown run from reserve fullback George Dunlap, a starting defensive lineman. He finished with three carries for 12 yards on successive plays to put Cabrillo up 12-0 early in the second quarter. After Dunlap scored, West Valley's Rodrick Nash returned the ensuing kickoff 79 yards to Cabrillo's 2-yard line. The next play, the Vikings fumbled away the ball, which Dunlap pounced on.

"We executed much better this week," said Seahawks coach Bill Garrison, not-

ing his team had a condensed playbook at practice. "They had energy and our defense came out and made sure that energy was short-lived."

Jackson eclipsed the 100-yard rushing mark early in the second quarter as the Seahawks worked with great field position for much of the contest.

Cabrillo's defense pressured quarterbacks Daniel Agostino and Frank Mems — who shared repetitions — and finished with three interceptions, including one that Derick Delucchi returned 36 yards for a touchdown for the final score.

"He does everything right," Garrison said of preparing for games. "And it's sweet to see him get the rewards."

Cliff Robinson and Tony Mora also recorded interceptions for the Seahawks.
